
## **SHERWOOD CC HISTORY**



Founded in 1989, Sherwood CC has a rich history of hosting PGA Tour events such as the Shark Shootout, hosted by Greg Norman, the World Challenge, hosted by Tiger Woods, as well as the 2020 ZOZO Championship. Before the course, Sherwood was also the location for several television shows and movies, most notably, the 1923 version of Robin Hood, starring Douglas Fairbanks, and the 1938 version, The Adventures of Robin Hood, starring Errol Flynn. Years later, both the golf and tennis clubs continue to be popular for a variety of film and television shoots.

### NORTH/SOUTH CHALLENGE

The North / South Challenge is a two-day competition between the NCGA and the SCGA participants, which takes place during stroke play qualifying on Monday and Tuesday. Each day the five lowest scores from each respective association are counted. The results are based on the scores over the course of the first two rounds. The association with the lowest two-day total is awarded the Lampham Trophy.

# **PLAYER INFORMATION**

#### STARTING TIMES AND PAIRINGS

- Starting times and pairings will be e-mailed to players and posted online at <u>scga.org</u> and <u>ncga.org</u> one week in advance of the championship.
- The lead group should plan to be at their assigned tee 10 minutes in advance of their starting time. Subsequent groups are encouraged to arrive once the preceding group has teed off. Players arriving late will be penalized under Rule 5.3a of the Rules of Golf. For example, the 9:00 a.m. starting time is defined as 9:00:00, and players arriving after that time are considered late.

#### **PRACTICE ROUNDS**

- Each player is limited to play in one practice round at their own expense.
- Practice rounds can be arranged through the practice round portal (found here) starting on Wednesday, May 22. Please note practice rounds occurring on Saturday-Sunday, June 22 & 23 will not be available for signup until Thursday, June 6. Please do not contact the golf shop to book practice rounds.
- Green fee: \$75 including cart.
- Dress code: Collared shirts, tucked in with belt, hats forward, no sweat/athletic shorts or pants, no cargo shorts, or pants.
- Practice on the driving range after practice rounds is not permitted.
- Please note, practice rounds are for players only. Players may bring a caddie, but the caddie may not play.

#### **TEES AND HOLE YARDAGES**

Play will predominantly be from the course's Bear yardages; however, there will be significant variety throughout the championship. Click <u>here</u> for hole-by-hole yardages.

#### PARKING AND REGISTRATION

- Ample parking is available at the facility.
- All participants must check in at the registration table located near the practice putting green on either Sunday, June 23 (12 – 3 p.m.) or Monday, June 24 beginning at 6 a.m.

#### **DRIVING RANGE & PRACTICE FACILITIES**

The driving range and practice facilities will be open by 6:30 a.m. each day of the championship.

#### LOCKER ROOM

The locker room will be available by 6:30 a.m. each day.



### DRESS CODE

Appropriate golf attire must be worn by all players, caddies and spectators, including adhering to any club-specific policies.


#### **FOOD SERVICE**

- Grab and go breakfast items will be available for purchase each day of the championship.
- Lunch will be hosted each day of the championship for participating players from 11:30 a.m. – 3 p.m.
- Caddies and spectators may purchase breakfast or lunch options and dine with their player.
- Major credit cards and cash will be accepted for F&B purchases.

#### **GOLF SHOP PURCHASES**

Major credit cards will be accepted for all purchases on property.

#### CADDIES

Players wishing to utilize a club caddie can secure one through the Golf Shop at (805) 267-4525. Caddie fee is \$100 to be paid in golf shop. Recommended caddie tip: \$40-50 in cash only.

#### **MOBILE DEVICE POLICY**

- Players, caddies, and spectators should turn mobile devices off or to silent mode while on the property and limit calls to inside their vehicle.
- Live scoring will be available throughout the championship at scga.org and ncga.org.

## POLICIES

#### **RULES OF PLAY**

- Prior to participating, participants must review the **Policies & Procedures.**
- <u>The Rules of Golf</u> as approved by the USGA and the R&A govern play.
- Local Rules and Terms of the Competition can be found on the <u>CGA Hard</u> <u>Card</u> and the Notice to Players that will be distributed onsite.
- Click here to review the <u>CGA Pace of</u> <u>Play Policy.</u>



#### **GOLF CARTS & PUSH/PULL CARTS**

- During a round, a player must not ride on any form of motorized transportation except as authorized or later approved by the Committee. Model Local Rule G-6.
- Players seeking to use a golf cart due to a medical or ADA-related reason must contact the SCGA in advance of the championship.
- Pull or push carts (including motorized pull or push carts) are allowed.

#### CADDIES

- Players may provide their own caddie for the championship proper.
- Refer to the Practice Round Memo for details regarding caddies at practice rounds.

### **CANCELLATION POLICY**

- To withdraw for any reason prior to the start of the championship, a player must notify the SCGA Championships & Golf Operations Department at champs@scga.org or (818) 980-3630.
- Failure to notify tournament staff will subject the player to suspension from future CGA competitions.
- Refund Policy:

- o Cancelation prior to the entry closing date: Full refund less a \$20 administrative fee.
- Cancelation after the entry closing date and more than 48 hours prior to the start of the competition: 50% of the entry fee.
- o Cancelation within 48 hours of the start of the competition: No refund.



## PACE OF PLAY POLICY

#### MAXIMUM ALLOWABLE TIME:

The Committee at each competition will determine the maximum allowable time each group is permitted to play the round and each hole. This time will be posted on each player's scorecard, and each player and group is expected to maintain a pace that is faster than the maximum allowable time. A hole ends in stroke play when all players have holed out, and in match play, when all players hole out or the result of the hole is decided. See Rule 23.3c for when a hole is completed in four-ball competition.

#### IN POSITION:

Groups are expected to remain in position throughout the round. Being in position means:

- » Reaching the teeing area of a par-3 before the group ahead has teed off on the next hole.
- » Reaching the teeing area of a par-4 before the group ahead leaves the putting green of that hole.
- » Reaching the teeing area of a par-5 before the group ahead gets to the putting green of that hole.

#### WARNINGS, CHECKPOINTS, PENALTIES:

If a group is over its maximum allowable time and out of position, an SCGA official may issue the group a warning and provide a checkpoint by when the group must regain its position (e.g., within the next two or three holes). If a group receives a warning, it will be monitored by an SCGA official to observe its pace of play.

- » If a group successfully regains its position by the established checkpoint, there will be no penalty to any player. If the group falls out of position again later in the round, an SCGA official may provide another checkpoint by when the group must be in position.
- » If a group fails to regain its position by an established checkpoint, all players in the group will be informed that the checkpoint was missed and that one or more players in the group will be liable to receive a one-stroke penalty. The SCGA official will then previde smatter should be size to ensure must approximately.



- will then provide another checkpoint by when the group must regain its position.
- » If the group fails to regain its position a second time, one or more players in the group will be liable to receive the general penalty (loss of hole in match play or two penalty strokes in stroke play).

If the Committee identifies that a player (or players) in the group is the cause of the group failing to maintain pace of play and determines other players are playing within the requirements of this policy, those meeting the requirements of this policy may be absolved from penalty while others may.

#### THE CGA TOURNAMENT COMMITTEE RESERVES THE RIGHT TO REVIEW ALL PENALTY SITUATIONS.

## LOCAL RULES AND TERMS OF THE COMPETITION

The Rules of Golf as approved by the United States Golf Association and The R&A govern play. These Local Rules and Terms of the Competition are in effect at all CGA championships and qualifying rounds. See applicable championship or qualifying round Notice to Players and Entry Application for modifications or additions to these Local Rules and Terms of the Competition. Complete text of the Rules and Local Rules may be found in the Official Guide to the Rules of Golf, effective January 2023. **Unless otherwise noted, the penalty for breach of a Local Rule is the general penalty.** 

**OUT OF BOUNDS** – Defined by the line between the course-side points of white stakes and fence posts at ground level.

**PENALTY AREAS** — When a penalty area is defined on only one side, it extends to infinity. When a penalty area is connected to the out-of-bounds edge, the penalty area extends to and coincides with out of bounds.

**GROUND UNDER REPAIR** – Defined by white lines. French drains are ground under repair.

Ground under repair may include areas of unusual damage but only when so declared by an authorized member of the Committee. When immediately adjacent to an immovable obstruction, such an area is part of that obstruction.

**RELIEF FROM SEAMS OF CUT TURF (SOD SEAMS)** — Model Local Rule F-7 as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect.

**AERATION HOLES** – Model Local Rule E-4 as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect.

**EDGING GROOVES** – Model Local Rule F-19 as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect.

WHITE-LINED AREAS TYING INTO ARTIFICIALLY SURFACED ROADS AND PATHS —White-lined areas of ground under repair and the artificially surfaced roads, paths or other identified obstructions that they are connected to are a single abnormal course condition when taking relief under Rule 16.1.

WOOD CHIPS AND MULCH - Are loose impediments.

**INTEGRAL OBJECTS** – Include artificial walls and pilings when located in penalty areas or in or adjacent to bunkers.

**PROHIBITING USE OF CERTAIN TYPES OF SHOES** – Model Local Rule G-7 as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect.

**LIST OF CONFORMING DRIVER HEADS** – Model Local Rule G-1 as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect.

**MISSING PLAYER OR MARKER CERTIFICATION** – Model Local Rule L-1 as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect.

**PRACTICE** — Prior to and after a round in stroke play, a player may practice on the designated practice areas. Rule 5.2b covering practice in stroke play is modified in this way: A player may not practice on the competition course before or between rounds. Penalty for breach of Local Rule, see Rule 5.2. **PACE OF PLAY** – See separate memorandum to players for pace of play policy.

**STOPPING AND RESUMING PLAY** – Model Local Rule J-1 as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect.

All practice areas are closed during an immediate suspension for a dangerous situation until the Committee has declared them open. Players who practice on closed practice areas will be asked to stop practicing; failure to stop practicing might result in disqualification.

An immediate suspension will be signaled by one prolonged air horn note. All other types of suspension will be signaled by three consecutive air horn notes. Resumption of play will be signaled by two short air horn notes.

#### WHEN COMPETITION IS FINAL:

**Stroke Play:** When the results and/or qualifiers and alternates have been determined. At championships, when the awards have been presented.

**Match Play:** When the result of a match has been reported to, and verified by, the committee.

**CODE OF CONDUCT\*** – By submitting an entry for any CGA-administered event, the contestant understands that his/her participation is at the sole discretion of the SCGA. A contestant may be removed from an event either before or during the event at the sole discretion of the CGA. Incidents of unbecoming conduct or actions deemed to be detrimental to the image of the CGA or the "Spirit of the Game" are grounds for such removal and suspension from future SCGA-administered events.

These include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Willful damage of the golf course or golf course property
- Club throwing or unnecessary club tossing
- Offensive or unbecoming language
- Public criticism of golf course or verbal abuse of SCGA staff, officials, volunteers, host club staff or other contestants
- Potential endangerment of others
- Conduct deemed unbecoming
- Failure to post scores for handicapping purposes
- Manipulation of scores posted for handicapping purposes

#### PENALTY FOR BREACH OF CODE OF CONDUCT First Offense: Warning Second Offense: Disqualification

\*The Committee may disqualify a player for serious misconduct in failing to meet the Code's standards\*

## **2023 CHAMPIONSHIP RECAP**

## ZACHERY POLLO CLINCHES BREAKTHROUGH TITLE, 5&4

When it was all finally over, Rocklin resident Zachery Pollo finally cracked a big smile.

Pollo (pronounced Po-Lo) joined the likes of Johnny Miller, Ken Venturi and Xander Schauffele as a California Amateur champion, defeating runner-up Dylan Oyama, 5 and 4, in the 36-hole final held Saturday at par-72 Lake Merced Golf Club.

An 18-year-old sophomore-to-be at University of Arizona, Pollo is one of the event's youngest winners. Mac Hunter won the 1972 title at 16.

Immediately after his victory, Pollo started receiving congratulatory texts from Wildcats head coach Jim Anderson as well as some of his teammates, including 2021 NCGA Amateur champ Sam Sommerhauser.



"It feels good. Coming into it, I knew it would be a long week," said Pollo, a former standout on the Junior Tour of Northern California. "There's a lot of golf. You just try to prepare yourself. Fortunately, I was able to come out on top."

A Pac-12 All Freshman Team pick last season, the No.14 seeded Pollo turned into a birdie machine to close out the match. Over his last 14 holes, he'd go 8-under.

Through the first 18 holes, Pollo had numerous chances to increase what was a 1-up lead but his putter didn't cooperate. At the midway break, following a quick meal Pollo went out and repeatedly practiced making 3 to 4-footers.

In the afternoon portion, he wouldn't just sink the shorter putts, he even began draining some 20 to 30-footers, including a winning eagle putt on the 32nd hole (par-5 14th).

"I didn't think my putting was all that great on the first 18. On the second 18, my putting was beyond good," Pollo said.

A sophomore-to-be at San Diego State, the No.16 seeded Oyama had never competed in an official match play event prior to the week.

His last lead was 1-up after a par win on No.12 in the morning. Through the first 25 holes, neither player ever held more than a 2-up lead.

"There's a lot of things I will stay take away from the week," said Oyama, who picked up the game from his grandfather around the age of 5. "There are also a lot of things I need to work on, including my stamina."

As for Pollo, while the week was also grueling, he's in a way been there and done. At only age 6, he competed in a 100 kilometer bike race. He also climbed Mount Whitney as a child. His mom Carrie and dad Jay are both into fitness, with Carrie even having once competed in the Boston Marathon.

"I was also tired as the week went on, but when you're in the moment, you still remain focused," Pollo said.

In the morning portion of the final, Pollo and Oyama see-sawed with neither ever holding more than a 2-up lead. Tied through 16 holes, Pollo grabbed a 1-up lead on the 17th when Oyama failed to reach the green in regulation, leading to a bogey. The two tied the 18th hole with pars.
