BIG CANYON CC HISTORY

Big Canyon CC, established in 1971, is a private club in urban Southern California with over 1,000 members, of which over 600 are golfing memberships. The club has hosted qualifying for many USGA championships, including eight U.S. Amateur qualifiers, three U.S. Women's Mid-Amateurs, four U.S. Open Final Qualifiers, and U.S. Senior Amateur Qualifying. Big Canyon was the site of the 1996 Pacific-10 Conference Men's Golf Championship, the 2002 SCGA Mid-Amateur Championship, the 2012 SCGA Amateur Championship, the 2014 U.S. Senior Amateur, and is this year's host to the California Amateur Championship.



Several top ranked golfers have called Big Canyon C.C. their home course including Tiger Woods from age 15 until he moved to Florida. John Cook, the 1975 California Amateur Champion, and Fred Couples both call Big Canyon CC their home course. Two-time U.S. Mid-Amateur Champion and three-time Walker Cup member Stewart Hagestad grew up playing Big Canyon and currently is a Junior Member.



Big Canyon CC has served hosts to U.S. Open Final Qualifying four times, where Stewart Hagestad qualified in 2017 and 2019.



PLAYER INFORMATION

STARTING TIMES AND PAIRINGS

- Starting times and pairings will be e-mailed to players and posted online at <u>scga.org</u> and <u>ncga.org</u> one week in advance of the championship.
- The lead group should plan to be at their assigned tee 10 minutes in advance of their starting time. Subsequent groups are encouraged to arrive once the preceding group has teed off. Players arriving late will be penalized under Rule 5.3a of the Rules of Golf. For example, the 9:00 a.m. starting time is defined as 9:00:00, and players arriving after that time are considered late.



PRACTICE ROUNDS

- One complimentary practice round will be issued to each championship contestant.
- Once the championship field is finalized, players will be provided instructions as to how to secure a
 practice round reservation through the Event Portal.
- Please note, practice rounds are for players only. Players may bring a caddie, but the caddie may not play. Players should not contact Big Canyon CC to arrange a practice round.

TEES AND HOLE YARDAGES

Play will predominantly be from the course's black yardages; however, there will be significant variety throughout the championship. Click **here** for hole-by-hole yardages.

PARKING AND REGISTRATION

- Ample parking is available at the facility.
- All participants must check in at the registration table located near the practice putting green on either Sunday, June 26 (12 – 3 p.m.) or Monday, June 27 beginning at 6 a.m.

DRIVING RANGE & PRACTICE FACILITIES

The driving range and practice facilities will be open by 6 a.m. each day of the championship.

LOCKER ROOM

- Each player will be issued a locker that can be used throughout the championship.
- The locker room will be available by 6:30 a.m. each day.



DRESS CODE

Appropriate golf attire must be worn, including adhering to any **club-specific policies.**

FOOD SERVICE

- Grab and go breakfast items will be available for purchase each day of the championship.
- Lunch will be hosted each day of the championship for participating players from 11:30 a.m. – 3 p.m.
- Caddies and spectators may purchase breakfast or lunch options and dine with their player.
- Major credit cards will be accepted for F&B purchases.

GOLF SHOP PURCHASES

Major credit cards will be accepted for all purchases on property.

SPECTATOR INFORMATION

- Spectators are welcome and encouraged to attend the California Amateur Championship.
- If spectators have any questions leading up to the event, please contact the SCGA Championships & Golf Operations Department at champs@scga.org.

CADDIES

Players may provide their own caddie (see section on Automotive Transportation below).

MOBILE DEVICE POLICY

- Players, caddies, and spectators should turn mobile devices off or to silent mode while on the property and limit calls to inside their vehicle.
- Live scoring will be available throughout the championship at scga.org and ncga.org.

PHOTO GALLERY

POLICIES

RULES OF PLAY

- Prior to participating, participants must review the Policies & Procedures.
- The Rules of Golf as approved by the USGA and the R&A govern play.
- Local Rules and Terms of the Competition can be found on the <u>CGA Hard</u> <u>Card</u> and the Notice to Players that will be distributed onsite.
- Click here to review the <u>CGA Pace of Play Policy.</u>



GOLF CARTS & PUSH/PULL CARTS

- During a round, a player must not ride on any form of motorized transportation except as authorized or later approved by the Committee. Model Local Rule G-6.
- Players seeking to use a golf cart due to a medical or ADA-related reason must contact the SCGA in advance of the championship.
- Pull or push carts (including motorized pull or push carts) are allowed.

CADDIES

- Players may provide their own caddie for the championship proper.
- Refer to the Practice Round Memo for details regarding caddies at practice rounds.

CANCELLATION POLICY

- To withdraw for any reason prior to the start of the championship, a player must notify the SCGA Championships & Golf Operations Department at champs@scga.org or (818) 980-3630.
- Failure to notify tournament staff will subject the player to suspension from future CGA competitions.
- Refund Policy:
 - o Cancelation prior to the entry closing date: Full refund less a \$20 administrative fee.
 - o Cancelation after the entry closing date and more than 48 hours prior to the start of the competition: 50% of the entry fee.
 - o Cancelation within 48 hours of the start of the competition: No refund.



PACE OF PLAY POLICY

The Tournament Committee at each competition will determine the maximum allowable time each group is permitted to play the round. This time will be posted on each player's scorecard and each player is expected to maintain a pace faster than the maximum allowable time. The round ends when all players in the group have holed out at the final hole. In four-ball stroke play, the round ends when all sides complete the final hole, either by both partners holing out or by one partner holing out on the final hole and the other partner choosing not to do so.

LEAD GROUP(S):

The lead group(s) must finish their round within the maximum allowable time established by the committee. If they finish over the maximum allowable time, each player will be assessed a penalty of two strokes to their score for the final hole.

» Exception: If the lead group is held up by play that was sent out before them, or play that began on another starting hole, they will be exempt from penalty if they finish over their maximum allowable time but within 14 minutes of the group in front of them.


SUBSEQUENT GROUPS:

Subsequent groups must finish their round within the maximum allowable time established by the committee. If they finish over the maximum allowable time, they must finish within 14 minutes of the group in front of them. If they finish over the maximum allowable time and more than 14 minutes behind the group in front of them, each player will be assessed a penalty of two strokes to their score for the final hole.

EXEMPTIONS FROM PENALTY:

If a group does not finish within their maximum allowable time due to circumstances beyond their control (such as a ruling or a ball search on the final hole, or any other circumstances which the Committee deems to be exceptional) but was otherwise in position during the play of the final four

holes, the Committee **may** be justified in waiving the penalty. Being in position means to be at a point on the course within 14 minutes of when the group in front of you was at that same point.



THE CGA TOURNAMENT COMMITTEE RESERVES THE RIGHT TO REVIEW ALL PENALTY SITUATIONS.



LOCAL RULES AND TERMS OF THE COMPETITION

The Rules of Golf as approved by the United States Golf Association and R&A Rules Limited govern play. These Local Rules and Terms of the Competition are in effect at all CGA championships and qualifying rounds. See applicable championship or qualifying round Notice to Players and Entry Application for modifications or additions to these Local Rules and Terms of the Competition. Complete text of the Rules and Local Rules may be found in the Official Guide to the Rules of Golf, effective January 2019.

Unless otherwise noted, the penalty for breach of a Local Rule is the general penalty.

OUT OF BOUNDS — Defined by the line between the course-side points of white stakes and fence posts at ground level.

PENALTY AREAS — When a penalty area is defined on only one side, it extends to infinity. When a penalty area is connected to the out-of-bounds edge, the penalty area extends to and coincides with out of bounds.

GROUND UNDER REPAIR – Defined by white lines. French drains are around under repair.

Ground under repair may include areas of unusual damage but only when so declared by an authorized member of the Committee. When immediately adjacent to an immovable obstruction, such an area is part of that obstruction.

RELIEF FROM SEAMS OF CUT TURF (SOD SEAMS) — Model Local Rule F-7 as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect.

AERATION HOLES – Model Local Rule E-4 as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect.

EDGING GROOVES — Model Local Rule F-19 as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect.

WHITE-LINED AREAS TYING INTO ARTIFICIALLY SURFACED ROADS AND PATHS —White-lined areas of ground under repair and the artificially

surfaced roads, paths or other identified obstructions that they are connected to are a single abnormal course condition when taking relief under Rule 16.1.

WOOD CHIPS AND MULCH - Are loose impediments.

INTEGRAL OBJECTS – Include artificial walls and pilings when located in penalty areas or in or adjacent to bunkers.

PROHIBITING USE OF CERTAIN TYPES OF SHOES – Local Rule asprescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect. ModelLocal Rule G-7.

LIST OF CONFORMING DRIVER HEADS – Model Local Rule G-7 as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect.

BROKEN OR SIGNIFICANTLY DAMAGED CLUB — Model Local Rule G-9 as prescribed in the Clarifications to the 2019 Rules of Golf is in effect.

BACK-ON-THE-LINE-RELIEF – Model Local Rule E-12 as prescribed in the Clarifications to the 2019 Rules of Golf is in effect.

LIMITING WHEN STROKE MADE FROM PUTTING GREEN MUST BE REPLAYED UNDER EXCEPTION 2 TO RULE 11.1B — Model Local Rule D-7 as prescribed in the Clarifications to the 2019 Rules of Golf is in effect.

PRACTICE — Prior to and after a round in stroke play, a player may practice on the designated practice areas. Rule 5.2b covering practice in stroke play is modified in this way: A player may not practice on the competition course before or between rounds. Penalty for breach of Local Rule, see Rule 5.2.

PACE OF PLAY – See separate memorandum to players for pace of play policy.

STOPPING AND RESUMING PLAY – Local Rule as prescribed in Section 8 of the Committee Procedures is in effect. Model Local Rule J-1.

All practice areas are closed during an immediate suspension for a dangerous situation until the Committee has declared them open. Players who practice on closed practice areas will be asked to stop practicing; failure to stop practicing might result in disqualification.

An immediate suspension will be signaled by one prolonged air horn note. All other types of suspension will be signaled by three consecutive air horn notes. Resumption of play will be signaled by two short air horn notes.

WHEN COMPETITION IS FINAL:

Stroke Play: When the results and/or qualifiers and alternates have been determined. At championships, when the awards have been presented. **Match Play:** When the result of a match has been reported to, and verified by, the committee.

CODE OF CONDUCT* – By submitting an entry for any CGA-administered event, the contestant understands that his/her participation is at the sole discretion of the CGA. A contestant may be removed from an event either before or during the event at the sole discretion of the CGA. Incidents of unbecoming conduct or actions deemed to be detrimental to the image of the CGA or the "Spirit of the Game" are grounds for such removal and suspension from future CGA-administered events.

These include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Willful damage of the golf course or golf course property
- Club throwing or unnecessary club tossing
- Offensive or unbecoming language
- Public criticism of golf course or verbal abuse of CGA staff, officials, volunteers, host club staff or other contestants
- Potential endangerment of others
- Conduct deemed unbecoming
- Failure to post scores for handicapping purposes
- Manipulation of scores posted for handicapping purposes

PENALTY FOR BREACH OF CODE OF CONDUCT

First Offense: Warning
Second Offense: Disqualification

^{*}The Committee may disqualify a player for serious misconduct in failing to meet the Code's standards.

2021 CHAMPIONSHIP RECAP

NOAH WOOLSEY ADDS NAME TO LONG LIST OF CAUFORNIA LEGENDS

Throughout the week, 22-year-old Pleasanton resident Noah Woolsey kept telling himself to believe. By the time it was over, it happened.

A senior at the University of Washington, the No.2 seed Woolsey erased an early three-hole deficit and came storming back to win the 110th California Amateur Championship over No.4 Wes Payne, 2 and 1, on a hot Saturday at The Preserve Golf Club in Carmel Valley.

Woolsey, who joins a list of California Amateur champions that includes Johnny Miller, Mark O'Meara and two-time winner Bobby Clampett, hadn't won an event since 2019. Clampett, who grew up in Carmel Valley, was among the spectators taking in the action.

"The whole week, I was just walking down the fairway telling myself, 'You can do this', over and over and over. It kind of calmed me down."



said Woolsey, who was rooted on by among others his mom, Miegen, and dad, Phil. "It's pretty crazy. I had a former California Amateur champ walking down the fairway with me. Just an incredible week."

A day after earning a spot in the 36-final via a gritty semifinals win on the 21st hole, Woolsey would quickly find himself down three holes after he opened the morning 18 holes with three consecutive bogeys. He'd twice cut the lead back to 1-up, but entered the break down three when Payne responded with a pair of birdies of his own on holes Nos. 16 and 17.

It was time again to just believe.

"My parents and others gave me a lot of encouragement, and I knew there was still a lot of golf left," said Woolsey, a former member of the Junior Tour of Northern California. "I reminded myself that I had come back in the semifinals and won. So why couldn't I do that again?"

Through the first four holes of the second 18, Payne, a 31-year-old real estate agent from San Francisco, held firm. But then on both holes Nos. 5 and 6, Payne made bogey after coming up short of the green with his approach and three-putting, respectively. The lead was suddenly just 1-up.

A hole later on the par-4 7th, Woolsey kept the pedal to the metal by holing our from 106 yards for an eagle to tie the match. "When I holed out that flipped things around for sure," Woolsey said."It was like all the holes before didn't matter."

Still riding the momentum, Woolsey would go on to take his first lead of the match on the 28th) hole (par-4 10th) when Payne's second shot bounded into the thick rough to the right of the green, leading to another bogey. Suddenly holding his first lead of the match, Woolsey kept it going with a birdie win on

the 11th and a par win on the 14th to take a commanding 3-up lead.

Payne, the runner-up at last year's NCGA Amateur Championship at Spyglass Hill, did cut the deficit back to 1-up with a par win on the 15th and a birdie win on the par-3 16th. But Woolsey yet again refused to give in. On the par-5 17th, still holding a 1-up lead, Woolsey hit a terrific pitch shot from just below the green to within a few feet of the flagstick to save par. Payne, meanwhile, could only watch as his own pitch attempt landed short, rolling back off the green and eventually leading to a bogey.

"I just played bad in the afternoon. There's no other way around it," said a dejected Payne afterwards. "I putted awful, and I hit some shots that I didn't hit all week."



Woolsey, meanwhile, will head to among other events such as the Pacific Coast Amateur with some extra confidence. And belief in himself. Earlier in the week, he was as member of Team NCGA Pacific Coast Amateur,

"I'm exhausted but also so excited," he said. "I didn't ever get fazed, even when I was down three through three. I just kept believing in myself."

PAST CHAMPIONS AND CURRENT BIG CANYON CC MEMBERS DON DUBOIS AND JORDAN NASSER PROVIDE THEIR SENTIMENTS ON THE CALIFORNIA AMATEUR BEING HELD AT THEIR HOME CLUB:

Q: What did it mean for you to win the California Amateur Championship?

NASSER: Winning the California Amateur is the highlight of my golfing career. Growing up in Southern California, I always wanted to be a part of this event. Having the chance to compete and win at Pebble Beach was a dream come true.

DUBOIS: This was a lifelong goal of mine to win the State Amateur as I played my first one when I was 16. To win it 30 years after my first attempt was a truly great feeling!

Q: How did that victory support your development and golfing career?

NASSER: Being a California State Amateur Champion opened a lot of doors for me to play in elite tournaments at fantastic courses around the nation. I am so thankful for those opportunities as well as for getting the chance to meet so many amazing people along the way.

DUBOIS: Well it was fun to do it late in life and share it with family and get invited to the Crump Cup at Pine Valley.

Q: What are your lasting memories of your winning performance?

NASSER: Having my dad on my bag and my mom walking alongside me for the entire event is a memory I will always cherish. My parents have always supported me and my golf career, and it was such an incredible feeling getting to celebrate the win with both of them.

DUBOIS: Coming back in the semifinals, one down, two to go with a birdie on 17 and winning on 17 in the championship match.

BIG CANYON CC Q&A

Q: Past champions include the likes of Ken Venturi, Johnny Miller, John Cook, Mark O'Meara, and Xander Schauffele. How does it feel to have your name on that same trophy?

NASSER: I am always humbled and amazed to be a part of the group of champions. When I was young, I looked up to Southern California Amateur legends like Don DuBois, Tim Hogarth, and Ed Cuff. To have my name on the same trophy as them and many other great champions is a true honor.

DUBOIS: The State Amateur has always been special to me and to be on the wall at Pebble Beach is an honor.

Q: What does this event mean to amateur golf in the state of California?

NASSER: I believe the SCGA and NCGA are among the finest golf associations in the country, and they put on the best State Amateur Championship in the nation. If you are from California, this is a "must play" event showcasing some of the best courses in the state.

DUBOIS: It is the ultimate test outside of USGA events for those of us who grew up in California.

Q: You were the last two champions of this event when it was played at Pebble Beach Golf Links. Now that this event rotates between Southern and Northern California, what does it mean to play this championship at your home club?

NASSER: Big Canyon Country Club is a special place that has given me so many memories with my children, friends, and family.
